Liberty High School, in Golden Valley Unified School District, is located within the unincorporated rural, residential community of Madera Ranchos. The District is located at the foot of the Sierra Nevada mountains in Madera County and is both north of Fresno (350,000 population) and east of the City of Madera (50,000 persons), the county seat. Liberty High School, a nine-year-old facility, includes the following classrooms: Administration/Library Building with two classrooms Cafeteria/Theater Building with two classrooms Arts Building with four classrooms two Science buildings with four science labs Gymnasium with two classrooms and two locker rooms Classroom building with nineteen classrooms Liberty High curricular offerings encompass all levels of student achievement from remedial courses to Honors and Advanced Placement courses. Students who want to get a head start on their future can gain early access to college courses through Liberty's partnership with State Center Community College, Madera Center. Liberty offers a number of electives to enhance and build students' individual talents and skills, including vocational offerings through the Regional Occupation Program and Carl Perkins funding. Liberty received honorable mention in the California Distinguished School Program in 2007. Liberty High's athletic and leadership programs provide students with the opportunity to develop and demonstrate leadership skills and make positive contributions to their peers, school, and community. Students take great pride in Liberty High's extracurricular programs which in turn receive tremendous support from parents and community members. Vision Statement Liberty High School is committed to providing students with rigorous, standards-based curricula in a safe, well-maintained educational environment. Staff and students are unified with the community to promote opportunities to develop positive character traits through learning, leadership, and involvement in meaningful activities. Mission To provide a rigorous and relevant educational system that prepares students for post-graduation goals and empowers them to become positive influences in our society.

## Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including the California Standards Tests (CSTs); the California Modified Assessment (CMA), and the California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA). The assessments under the STAR program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. The CSTs include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven. The CAPA includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations. The CMA is an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through nine, mathematics for grades three through seven and Algebra I and science in grades five, eight, and ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels. ### Admission Requirements for California Public Universities

#### University of California

Admission requirements for the University of California (UC) follow guidelines set forth in the Master Plan, which requires that the top one-eighth of the state's high school graduates, as well as those transfer students who have successfully completed specified college work, be eligible for admission to the UC. These requirements are designed to ensure that all eligible students are adequately prepared for University-level work. #### California State University

They are specific high school courses; grades in specified courses and test scores; and graduation from high school. Some campuses have higher standards for particular majors or students who live outside the local campus area. Because of the number of students who apply, a few campuses have higher standards (supplementary admission criteria) for all applicants. Most CSU campuses utilize local admission guarantee policies for students who graduate or transfer from high schools and colleges that are historically served by a CSU campus in that region.
